






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Ontario Ridings



124 ridings


(geographic electoral districts)

Seating Arrangement in the House





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
Parliaments and Sessions

- A parliament is marked by an election and can be divided into one or more sessions, usually consisting of a number of separate sittings.
- A **session** begins with a Speech from the Throne and ends with the prorogation or dissolution of the Parliament. A Parliament can rise for a break without starting a new session (e.g. summer adjournment).
- Prorogation ends the current legislative session and terminates all business;
 Dissolution terminates Parliament and is followed by a general election.
- When a parliament is dissolved or prorogued, all Bills under consideration "die on the order paper" and must be reintroduced in the next parliament.
- This 42nd Parliament (1st Session) (June 29, 2018 September 12, 2021) just ended with prorogation and a **42nd Parliament (2nd Session)** is scheduled to begin on October 4, 2021.
- 41st Parliament: Session 1 (July 2, 2014 September 8, 2016); Session 2 (September 12, 2016 March 15, 2018); Session 3 (March 19, 2018 May 8, 2018); Dissolution (May 8, 2018); Election (June 2, 2018).



The Legislative Process

- The process of passing bills into law is one of the main tasks of the Legislative Assembly.
- A Bill is an idea written in legal language and presented for consideration to the Legislative Assembly by a Member of Provincial Parliament (MPP).
- Bills are a proposal to either make a new law or to change one or more existing laws.
- Must pass through the legislative stages and achieve Royal Assent to become Ontario law (an "Act").






Types of Bills

- **Public bills** relates matters of public policy and are generally initiated by elected officials. There are three kinds of public Bills in Ontario:
 - Government Bills introduced by Cabinet Ministers.
 - <u>Private Members' Bills (PMBs)</u> introduced by any MPP who is not a Cabinet Minister (both government and opposition MPPs).
 - <u>Committee Bills</u> introduced by the Chairs of certain Standing Committees of the Legislature (Justice Policy, Social Policy, General Government).
- Private bills are proposed laws that seek special powers or exemptions for a particular person, group or corporation. Members of the public must file an application with the Clerk and have an MPP sponsor the bill.
- Bills are numbered in the order they are introduced in that session. Private bills have their own numbering (PR1, PR2, etc.).



The Legislative Role of Cabinet (*Government Bills*)



- The Cabinet (Executive Council) of Ontario is comprised of the Premier and the Ministers they appoint.
- Collectively responsible for advising in the setting of public policy and for directing government activities.
- The Legislation and Regulations
 Committee (LRC) of Cabinet
 evaluates proposals for new (or to
 amend existing) legislation and
 regulations.
- Government Bills are submitted to the Assembly following prelegislative stages that conclude with Cabinet Approval.

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Legislation "Coming into Force" and Proclamation

- Although a Bill becomes law (an Act) on the day that it receives Royal Assent, it
 may not always come into force on the same date.
- An Act's in force date (=when it has legal effect and is enforceable):
 - Is always denoted within the legislation's Commencement clause.
 - May be the date that the authorizing Bill receives Royal Assent.
 - May not be specified for a given date, but may come into force "on a day to be named by proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor" or concurrent with the Royal Assent date of another named legislation.
 - May be the same for the entire legislation, or may differ for different parts of a Bill (schedules) and for different parts of an Act (sections, clauses).
- Proclamations dates for legislation are decided by the government and published online (https://www.ontario.ca/laws/proclamations).
- The <u>Ontario Gazette</u> is the official publication for legislative decisions, Cabinet orders (Orders in Council (OICs)), proclamations of new statutes, all regulations made under Ontario statutes, and notices that must be made public.



Regulations

- A **Regulation** is always associated with and filed under an Act, which provides the enabling authority for that Regulation.
- Regulations often provide additional details and specific requirements for a regulatory regime authorized under an Act.
- Can be filed, amended or repealed by a Minister or designated authority/agency without needing to go through the legislative process.
- Allow the Minister or designated authority to modify requirements under the regime more easily and as needed to keep them current.
- <u>Environmental Protection Act, RSO 1990</u>, Part X: Spills, s. 91.1: requires entities **prescribed by regulation** to develop and implement spill prevention and contingency plans to prevent and reduce the risk of spills of pollutants they handle.
 - O. Reg. 224/07 Spill Prevention and Contingency Plans: describes who is subject to this planning requirement and specifies content and submission requirements for those planning documents.







EXPLANATORY NOTE

This Explanatory Note was written as a reader's aid to Bill 269 and does not form part of the law.
Bill 269 has been enacted as Chapter 8 of the Statutes of Ontario, 2021.

SCHEDULE 1 CREDIT UNIONS AND CAISSES POPULAIRES ACT, 1994

Subsection 276 (2) of the Credit Unions and Caisses Populaires Act, 1994 is amended to provide that the Deposit Insurance Reserve Fund may be used to pay for fees in respect of credit agreements entered into by the Financial Services Regulatory Authority of Ontario to provide financial assistance to the credit union sector.

SCHEDULE 2 CREDIT UNIONS AND CAISSES POPULAIRES ACT, 2020

Subsection 224 (2) of the Credit Unions and Caisses Populaires Act, 2020 is amended to provide that the Deposit Insurance Reserve Fund may be used to pay for fees in respect of credit agreements entered into by the Financial Services Regulatory Authority of Ontario to provide financial assistance to the credit union sector.

SCHEDULE 3 ELECTRICITY ACT, 1998

The Schedule repeals subsection 50 (5) of the *Electricity Act*, 1998. Currently, subsection 50 (5) of the Act provides that if an agent of Her Majesty in right of Ontario is paid dividends from Hydro One Limited shares, the agent must pay the dividends to the Ontario Electricity Financial Corporation less any amount of payment obligations assumed by the agent or Her Majesty in right of Ontario under clause 122 (1) (a) of the Act.

Commencement

- (2) The Schedules to this Act come into force as provided in each Schedule.
- (3) If a Schedule to this Act provides that any provisions are to come into force on a day to be named by proclamation of the Lieutenant Governor, a proclamation may apply to one or more of those provisions, and proclamations may be issued at different times with respect to any of those provisions.




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Using E-Laws - Overview


- Once a Bill achieves Royal
 Assent, it is posted on E Laws regardless if in force or awaiting proclamation.
- E-laws provides a record of all consolidated statues of Ontario from 1990 onwards in a searchable database.
- Includes all regulations filed under Acts, both in force and revoked/spent.
- Note: provisions awaiting proclamation (to be put into force or repealed) are block highlighted in grey.



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
Searching for Laws – Boolean Operators



- Operative words used to connect keywords together to either narrow or broaden search results.
- Four basic Boolean operators:
 - AND only results with all of the keywords
 - OR only results with any of the keywords
 - <u>NOT</u> only results without a keyword
 - <u>"Phrase"</u> only results with specific phrase
- Use these Boolean operators to:
 - Focus a search, particularly when the topic contains multiple search terms.
 - Narrow search results to exactly what you are looking for.
 - Find only those laws which reference a given phrase, entity, etc.



Navigating a Law





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Legislative History - Prior versions/amendments





About This Collection

This is a collection of statutes of the Province of Ontario, from colonial times to 1999 inclusive, as officially published in the annual or sessional statute volumes for the year(s) when the legislation was passed. The collection includes both new and amending statutes (source law) as originally enacted by the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, and the statutes are not consolidated.

The original statutes were published by the <u>Queen's Printer for Ontario</u> annually or at the end of legislative sessions and constitute the official record of legislation as passed and enacted by the <u>Legislative Assembly of Ontario</u>. The printed volumes presented here were assembled from the collections of the <u>Osgoode Hall Law School Library</u> at <u>York University</u> and of the <u>Bora Laskin Law Library</u> at the <u>University of Toronto</u> and were digitized by the <u>Internet Archive</u> at the Internet Archive Canada facility located in the <u>Robarts Library</u> at the <u>University of Toronto</u>. Funding for the project was provided by the <u>Ontario Council of University Libraries (OCUL)</u> as part of its <u>Ontario Digitization Initiative (ODI)</u>. The digitized volumes of statutes were edited into their component parts, and metatdata was collected and assembled by librarians and staff at the <u>Osgoode Hall Law School Library</u> with assistance from colleagues at the <u>Great Library of the Law Society of Upper Canada</u>.

This collection of the annual (sessional) statutes of the Province of Ontario has been produced and is made available as a public service. It is a product of our commitment to making quality legal information available to the public free of charge, and



- New administrative monetary penalties regime for environmental contraventions.
- Passed by the Legislature and received Royal Assent in 2019




